

Programs in art, architecture, and interior design all face the challenge of providing students with information from around the world. History of Furniture: A Global View covers the major historical movements in furniture design (from prehistoric periods through contemporary times) and includes parts of the world that traditional history books ignore or underserve, such as Africa and China. It presents the achievements of Western furniture designers, not in isolation from the rest of the globe, but in vibrant contact with it. For example, students will learn about the influence of Islamic design on Romanesque style and Thailand's interpretation of Art Nouveau. In short, this comprehensive book with a global perspective focuses on the evolution of furniture from ancient history through postmodernism.

This is an extremely useful overview of the development of furniture from the stone age to the present. It does cover the globe. For example, there's a very interesting section on African modernism. The chapters give a lot of architectural and artistic context, so you can see the overall

setting in which the furniture would have been used. There are very nice color photographs throughout. My only complaint, which is minor, is that the photo used opposite the first page of each chapter isn't identified, which can be frustrating. I'm not an expert in furniture, but this gave me an excellent sense of the big picture.
