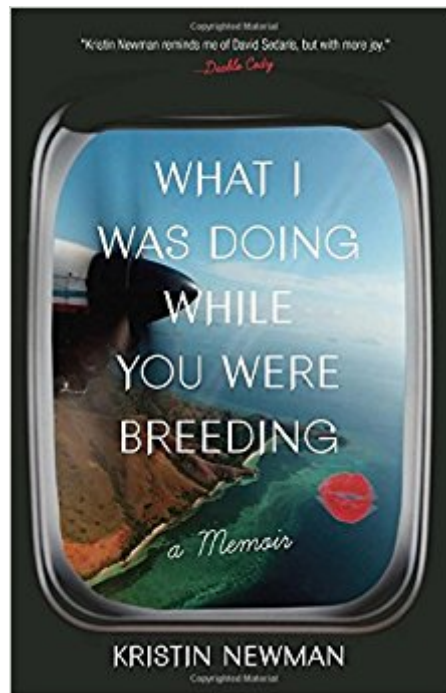




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What I Was Doing While You Were Breeding: A Memoir



Synopsis

A funny, sexy, and ultimately poignant memoir about mastering the art of the "vacationship." Kristin Newman spent much of her twenties and thirties buying dresses to wear to her friends' weddings and baby showers. Not ready to settle down and in need of an escape from her fast-paced job as a sitcom writer, Kristin instead traveled the world, often alone, for several weeks each year. In addition to falling madly in love with the planet, Kristin fell for many attractive locals, men who could provide the emotional connection she wanted without costing her the freedom she desperately needed. Kristin introduces readers to the Israeli bartenders, Finnish poker players, sexy Bedouins, and Argentinean priests who helped her transform into "Kristin-Adjacent" on the road—a slower, softer, and, yes, sluttier version of herself at home. Equal parts laugh-out-loud storytelling, candid reflection, and wanderlust-inspiring travel tales, *What I Was Doing While You Were Breeding* is a compelling debut that will have readers rushing to renew their passports.

Television scribe Newman (*How I Met Your Mother*, *The Neighbors*) shares her comedic and romantic adventures abroad during the last decade-and-a-half. After spending her twenties in serious relationships yet afraid, ultimately, of settling down permanently, Newman got bit by the travel bug and discovered that the best way to battle her commitment phobia was to romance handsome strangers abroad. These brief "vacationships" satisfied Newman's desire for excitement and passion while not making her feel trapped. She cavorted with a handsome

bartender in Russia, a sexy former priest in Argentina, and an aggressive surfer in Brazil. Newman describes the exotic locales as lushly as she does her companions, taking armchair travelers to Iceland, Australia, and Israel and sharing some of her travel snafus, such as losing her passport in Buenos Aires and being deemed a potential terror suspect by Israeli authorities seemingly because she's a single woman in her thirties traveling alone. Newman adeptly mixes humor and heart, making this the perfect read for anyone in search of love, adventures abroad, or both. --Kristine Huntley

Most of my friends that I have given this book to won't rave about it like I do; however, I think that is because I read it 6 months and three countries after my six year relationship ended. It was funny, insightful, validating, and inspiring!! It was distracting to be in new countries but simultaneously wanting to hear more about Kristin's trips!

I am a well travelled Northwestern alum so I felt a double affinity for the author from the start. Her book was one I read over two days while on the exercise bike at the gym. I broke out laughing so many times that my gym mates must have been wondering about me! But a book written by a comedy writer should do that to the reader! Like Kirstin, I love to travel. In my case, I have been to 80 countries and lived in 9 of them for at least a year. "I read Eat Pray Love, which caused me intense stress due to how much I both hated the narrator for her self-involved, self-inflicted misery in the middle of a pretty amazing life, and deeply related to her, due to my tendency to be self-involved and inflict misery on myself in the middle of my pretty amazing life."

Kristin is constantly on the go and her memoir is like catching up with a good friend over drinks.
