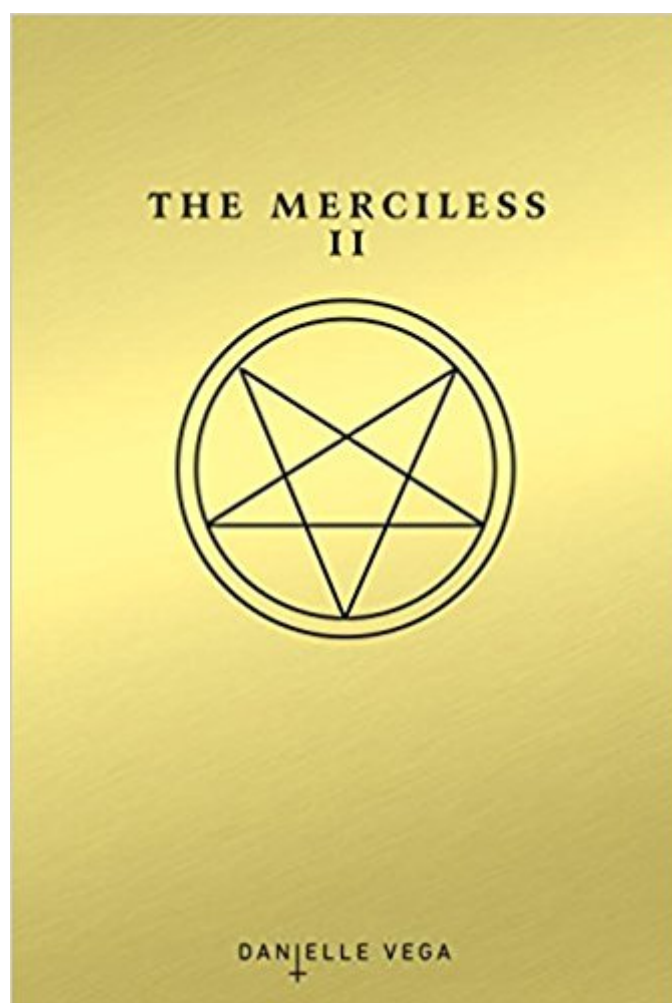

Gr 9 Up "Sofia Flores has lost everything. After months of therapy following Riley's murder, she has finally convinced herself that Brooklyn's demonic possession was all in her head. When her mom gets into a fatal car accident, Sofia has to relocate to a Catholic boarding school. It is old, with

a strict morality code. Sofia meets her new roommates, sweet Leena and bad girl Sutton. The protagonist manages to catch the eye of a hot altar boy during mass. He happens to be the same boy whom Leena fancies. As temptation clouds Sofia's judgment, she starts to believe Brooklyn's distant claim that she is indeed evil. Can she resist sinning? This pulse-pounding follow-up to Vega's *Merciless* focuses on Sofia as she attempts to put the horrible events of the first novel behind her. As Sofia deals with unfamiliar religious surroundings, she begins to think that she's beyond redemption. She tries to find support in friendly Sister Lauren and creepy Father Marcus but can't shake a dark sense of foreboding. With strong, well-developed supporting characters, this novel is a terrifying delight of a read. Sometimes Sofia can't help but give in to her dark side, but readers will be hard-pressed to root against her. This sequel could potentially work as a stand-alone but will be especially enjoyed by fans of the previous volume. With an intensely violent climax, this story will work well for horror readers who don't shy away from prose that may make some readers squeamish. It was, what I expected.

I think the only reason I enjoyed the first book so much was because I was new to the horror genre and this sequel affirmed that for me. The more I reflected on the last one, the more I could see the obvious writing flaws in retrospect. Unfortunately many of those same flaws were apparent in this story as well. There's very little character building and as a result I felt very little sympathy, relation

or even understanding to any of the characters, this made it difficult to keep reading. At one point every character, setting and plot device felt like a huge cliché. The same horror tropes are trotted out over and over again making the plotline supremely predictable and nothing original created. I felt this way so strongly I found myself rolling my eyes and feeling annoyed often especially towards the end of the book. At times it was so outlandish and unsurprising it bordered on parody and mockery. There was so much potential in the beginning but ultimately fell flat. I really wanted to like this series so much but now I'm uncertain if I'll want to buy the next one when it comes out.

I read the first book in under 2 hours and, quite frankly, was questioning my judgement in reading it home alone. I read the second one within 2 hours also and was still unnerved- even without being home alone this time around. I came to the end of this one and quickly closed it, stealing a nervous glance around my room to make sure the possessed Sofia Flores wasn't going to jump out and attack me. It was fantastically terrifying. I highly recommend this sequel to anyone and everyone who loved the first book and is looking for a good follow up.

This is my third novel by this author and I have to say that I think I love each of her books equally. That is something so hard for an author to do in today's time. I mean, there is no pleasing everyone with everything you do, but I think that Danielle Vega has defied the expectation that a sequel has to be bad. This doesn't compare to the brutal and insane nature of the first book, but I don't think I would compare it to the first novel. I first read the original book when it first came out about two years ago, yet for some reason it still sticks with me to this day. I see the second installment as another book entirely. Sure, the events of the first book is mentioned and they help play a role in the story, but to me it seemed that even though the reader was following the next trials in Sofia's life, this was a different book entirely. There are similarities, but I see a lot of differences. From what I remember about the first book, I see that this book has more of an emphasis on the darker side of religion (which I loved).

The book's location is even different from the first (I didn't read the description beforehand because I already knew I would enjoy it) and that came as a shock to me. The way that this book

sets up everything makes me think of all of the other boarding school books that I have read over the past few year, yet the story changes in the amazing Danielle Vega fashion to something completely DARK. I just thought that the setting really elevated the story because of how cut off it is from reality. Everything is intense and familiar because of all the elements carried over from other books that I have read. I loved that aspect. I do think that anything this author writes is pure horror gold, but not everyone would feel that way. I actually really liked reading about the main character Sofia, and the new characters in this novel were very intriguing. I found myself wanting to yell at Sofia the entire book because everything she did was so frustrating. Like with THE MERCILESS, this book is filled with those same, if not more surprising, twists that will come out of nowhere. I don't want to give away too much about the story because it is relatively short. I actually found the book to not be as scary as I expected, though it was definitely horror-filled. These books are definitely creepy reads and are perfect for fans of horror! THE MERCILESS books are actually pretty violent so I would recommend them to a more mature YA audience. I read these at
